## Environmental Quality?

- Improvement in quality and quality control of processing, not the final product, can have a small impact on the environment and sustainability by reducing reprocessing or corrections to colour
- A more holistic approach crossing the boundaries of the different parts of the textile industry is needed involving suppliers, converters, garment makers and Retail working together to reduce the total impact
